ELECTIONS HAVE CONSEQUENCES

In the Presidential Election of 1876, the Democrat, Samuel J. Tilden, Governor of New York won the popular vote while Rutherford B. Hayes, the Republican, allegedly won the Electoral College. In the country's 100th year, it had what was called "The Disputed Election". Southern Democrats (the former Confederacy) negotiated a resolution to the Disputed Election. The settlement resulted in the end of federal troops in the former Confederate States. The Republicans agreed to this in exchange for Rutherford B. Hayes being certified as the newly elected President of the United States.



The consequences of this resolution were the end of Reconstruction, the end of Black representation in the deep south for 100 years, the creation and spread of the Ku Klux Klan, the use of vagrancy laws to imprison Black males (resulting in the re-enslavement of Blacks), and the creation of Jim Crow laws that subjugated Blacks to lynching, forced labor camps, and second class or no class status until post the Civil Rights Movement.

In the Presidential Election of 2000, Vice-President Al Gore beat Governor George W. Bush by more than one million votes. Yet, the 537-vote difference in Florida gave Bush the Presidency. This election resulted in Bush appointing two Supreme Court judges including Chief Justice, John Roberts, two wars (Afghanistan and Iraq). Afghanistan was invaded to destroy Al Queda and capture Osama Bin Laden. It was to take a matter of months. America was in Afghanistan for nearly 20 years. Iraq played no role in the 9/11/01 attack on America, yet we invaded that country and built the largest U. S. Embassy. America suffered death of thousands of service men and women. Tens of thousands of American military personnel suffered grievous injuries physically and emotionally. In Bush's second term, the country suffered a financial crisis that caused the largest number of foreclosures since the Great Depression.

In the election of 2016, former Secretary of State, Hilary Clinton received nearly 3 million more votes than Donald J. Trump. The 45th President appointed 3 members to the Supreme Court, created havoc daily in the country and around the world, led a failed insurrection to overturn the 2020 Presidential Election (an election in which he lost by 7 million votes) and disastrously failed to lead the country during the Covid-19 crisis.

Those 5 members of the Supreme Court appointed by the Presidents who did not receive the popular vote have gutted the Voting Rights Act, defined a corporation as a person, reversed **Roe v. Wade**, and limited the EPA's ability to utilize the Clean Air Act to address climate change.

Yes, elections have consequences. The upcoming midterm election is the most important election of our lives. Vote your voice on November 8, 2022.

Ketanji Brown Jackson sworn in as first Black woman on the Supreme Court

Ketanji Brown Jackson has been sworn <u>as the</u> <u>116th Supreme Court justice</u> and the first Black woman to serve on the high court.



The ceremony caps a months-long process that essentially began February, when President Biden, <u>fulfilling a campaign promise</u> to nominate the first Black woman to the Supreme Court, announced Jackson, 51, as his pick to replace Justice Stephen Breyer, 83. Breyer — whom Jackson clerked for after she graduated from Harvard Law School in 1996 — <u>officially retired Thursday</u>, paving the way for her to be sworn in.

"For too long, our government, our courts haven't looked like America," <u>Biden said when he nominated her</u>. "And I believe it's time that we have a court that reflects the full talents and greatness of our nation with a nominee of extraordinary qualifications and that we inspire all young people to believe that they can one day serve their country at the highest level."

At the noon ceremony at the Supreme Court, Jackson, <u>took two oaths</u>: a constitutional oath, administered by Chief Justice John Roberts, and a judicial oath, administered by Breyer. A formal investiture for Jackson will follow in fall.



Biden awards Medal of Honor to four Vietnam veterans

Biden praised the Vietnam veterans for going 'far above and beyond the call of duty' at the Medal of Honor ceremony

Four Vietnam veterans awarded the Medal of Honor

President Biden awarded four U.S. Army soldiers who fought in the <u>Vietnam War</u> the Medal of Honor Tuesday, upgrading awards they had previously received.

Biden presented the Medal of Honor to Staff Sgt. <u>Edward N. Kaneshiro</u>, Spc. Five <u>Dwight W. Birdwell</u>, Spc. Five <u>Dennis M. Fujii</u>, and retired Maj. <u>John J. Duffy</u>. Speaking at a ceremony in the White House East Room,

Biden praised their heroism, noting that many like them don't receive "the full recognition they deserve."

"Today, we're setting the record straight. We're upgrading the awards of four soldiers who performed acts of incredible heroism during the Vietnam conflict," Biden said.

"It's just astounding when you hear what each of them have done," he said. "They went far above and beyond the call of duty. It's a phrase always used but ... it takes on life when you see these men."

Addressing the three living soldiers and relatives of Kaneshiro, who is deceased, the president said, "I'm proud to finally award our highest military recognition, the Medal of Honor, to each of you."

Kaneshiro was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for acts of gallantry while serving near Phu Huu 2 in Vietnam on Dec. 1, 1966. Kaneshiro and his team entered the village of Phu Huu 2 while on a search and destroy mission and were attacked by North Vietnamese forces. Kaneshiro destroyed one enemy group with rifle fire and two others with grenades, which enabled the orderly extrication and reorganization of the platoon and ultimately led to a successful withdrawal from the village, according to the White House. He served in Vietnam between July 18, 1966, until his death on March 6, 1967, as a result of a hostile gunshot wound.

Biden noted that more than 50 years had passed "since the jungles of Vietnam where, as young men, these soldiers first proved their mettle. But time has not diminished their astonishing bravery, their selflessness in putting the lives of others ahead of their own and the gratitude that we as a nation owe them."

Birdwell received his Medal of Honor for acts of heroism while serving in Vietnam on Jan. 31, 1968. According to the White House, that day a large enemy element initiated an assault on the Tan Son Nhut Airbase near Saigon and disabled or destroyed many of the unit's vehicles and incapacitated Birdwell's tank commander.

Birdwell moved the tank commander to safety and fired the tank's weapons at the enemy force. He lated dismounted and continued fighting until receiving enemy fire to his face and torso. Birdwell refused evacuation and led a small group of defenders to disrupt the enemy assault until reinforcements arrived, the White House said. Birdwell then aided in evacuating the wounded until he was ordered to seek attention for his own wounds. He was honorably discharged on Dec. 29, 1968, and today practices law in Oklahoma City.

Fuijii received the Medal of Honor for his actions while serving as crew chief aboard a helicopter ambulance during rescue operations in Laos and the Republic of Vietnam from Feb. 18–22, 1971. According to the White House, during a mission to evacuate seriously wounded Vietnamese military personnel, Fujii's medevac helicopter took on enemy fire and was forced to crash land.

Despite his injury, Fujii waved off a rescue from another helicopter and remained behind as the only American on the battlefield and administered first aid to allied casualties. On the night of Feb. 19, he called in American helicopter gun-



ships to assist in repelling an enemy attack. For more than 17 hours, the White House said, Fujii repeatedly exposed himself to hostile fire as he left the security of his entrenchment to better observe enemy troop positions and to direct air strikes against them until an American helicopter could attempt to airlift him from the area. Upon completion of his tour, he joined the Army Reserve and today resides in Hawaii.

Duffy was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions while serving as the senior adviser to the 11th Airborne Battalion, 2nd Brigade, Airborne Division, Army of the Republic of Vietnam, from April 14-15, 1972. The White House said that two days earlier, the commander of the 11th Airborne Battalion had been killed, the battalion



command post destroyed, and Duffy was twice wounded, but refused to give up.

According to the White House, in the early morning of April 15, after an enemy ambush, he led evacuees, many of whom were seriously wounded, to an evacuation area, where he directed gunship fire on enemy positions and marked a landing zone for the helicopters. The White House said that only after ensuring all evacuees were aboard, did he board as well, assisting a wounded friendly foreign soldier and administering aid to a wounded helicopter door gunner. Duffy's service included three tours in Vietnam in a myriad of Special Forces assignments, and he retired from the Army on May 31, 1977. Duffy went on to become an author and once was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize for poetry. "He is the definition of a warrior poet," Biden said.

He currently lives in Santa Cruz, California.


WOODY WILLIAMS, AMERICA'S LAST WORLD WAR II MEDAL OF HONOR RECIPIENT. DIES

Hershel "Woody" Williams, America's last surviving World War II veteran to have received a <u>Medal of Honor</u>, passed away surrounded by family on Wednesday morning.

Williams, 98, was the last of the 473 American service members who received a Medal of Honor in WWII. Williams spent his final days with family at a hospital in his home state of West Virginia. Family members called on Americans to pray for him on Tuesday.

"As he lives out his last days, we welcome and appreciate any additional prayers lifted up on behalf of Woody and his family," his family said in a statement on his condition at the time.



America's 63 living Medal of Honor recipients honored Williams in a statement to Fox News Digital.

"Friends and family of Woody Williams knew him as a West Virginia farmer's son and the youngest of 11 children who dutifully supported his family after his father died," they wrote in a statement through the Congressional Medal of Honor Society. "Fellow Marines knew him as the corporal who volunteered for a mission on Iwo Jima to clear a lane through enemy pill-boxes that were destroying American tanks."

"Veterans in West Virginia knew him as their advocate through his work as a Veterans Service Representative. Gold Star families knew Woody through his work raising money for scholar-ships and other programs through the Woody Williams Foundation," they continued. "We, his fellow Medal of Honor Recipients, knew him as our friend and one of our heroes. We will miss him greatly."

US Navy christens only warship named for a foreign capital

(CNN)A bottle of wine was broken across a mass of gray metal in Mobile, Alabama, on Saturday, as the United States Navy unveiled the only ship in its fleet to be named after a foreign capital.

The USS Canberra -- named for Australia's seat of power -- is a brand new littoral combat ship, one of the US Navy's newest platforms.

"It says much to the strength of the friendship between our two nations that Australia is the only allied country whose capital the US Navy has used to name a ship," Commodore Matthew Hudson, Australia's military attached at its embassy in Washington, said at the christening ceremony Saturday.

The ship is the second US Navy vessel to bear the Canberra name. The first was during World War II, when the then-USS Pittsburgh, a cruiser, was renamed Canberra after an Australian ship of the same name was sunk by Japanese forces in the Battle of Savo Island, part of the Guadalcanal campaign in the Solomon Islands.

The cruiser Canberra would go on the serve until 1970, with roles in the Cuban missile crisis and the Vietnam War.

"I am proud to join Australian partners in continuing the legacy of this name," Vice Adm. Ricky Williamson, US deputy chief of naval operations, said at Saturday's ceremony.

The first Canberra was also in the US fleet when the ANZUS Treaty, a non-binding security agreement among the United States, Australia and New Zealand, was struck in 1951.

Hudson noted that milestone on Saturday.

"As we mark the 70th anniversary of the ANZUS alliance, the friendship between our two countries is stronger than ever," he said.

"The alliance between our two countries makes the world a safer place," said Todd Schafer, an acting assistant secretary of the Navy.

The newest USS Canberra is a 421-foot- (128-meter-) long, 3,200-metric-ton ship that can accommodate a crew of up to 75 sailors.

US Navy adds powerful new missile in Pacific

With a top speed of around 50 mph (80 kph), it will be one of the fastest ships in the US Navy. It will also be armed with the <u>Naval Strike Missile</u>, a sea-skimming cruise missile that is difficult to spot on radar, and can maneuver to avoid enemy defenses.

Littoral combat ships come in two variants, the single-hull Freedom class and the Independence class catamarans, of which Canberra is the 15th. ... Continue on page 11b.

US Navy christens...

The symbolism of tight US-Australia security ties extends beyond the ship's name. It was built at the shipyard of Austal USA, part of the Australia-based global defense giant Austal.

"Just 16 years after Austal USA joined the US defense industrial base, the company is hosting its 15th littoral combat ship christening -- LCS 30, a ship proudly named after the capital of Australia and yet another symbol of the great ties between our two countries," Austal USA interim president Rusty Murdaugh said.

The Canberra's christening marks the ship's evolution from construction to testing its systems at sea. It will be commissioned when that testing is complete and then join the fleet for deployment.

One other ship in the US fleet, the amphibious assault ship USS Tripoli, does bear the name of the capital of Llbya. However, the ship was named for the involvement of US forces in the 1805 Battle of Derna, fought in what was then known as the Kingdom of Tripoli, a province of the Ottoman Empire.

No Greater Love

Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. John 15:13

Commemorations of the seventy-fifth anniversary of D-Day in 2019 honored the more than 156,000 troops who took part in the largest seaborne invasion in history to liberate Western Europe. In his prayer broadcast over the radio on June 6, 1944, President Roosevelt asked for God's protection, praying, "They fight not for the lust of conquest. They fight to end conquest. They fight to liberate."

A willingness to put one's self in harm's way to restrain evil and liberate the oppressed brings to mind Jesus' words: "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). These words come in the midst of Christ teaching His followers to love each other. But He wanted them to understand the cost and depth of this type of love: a love exemplified when one willingly sacrifices his or her life for another person. Jesus' call to sacrificially love others is the basis of His command to "love each other" (v. 17).

Perhaps we could show sacrificial love by giving time to care for the needs of an aging family member. We could put the needs of a sibling first by doing their chores during a stressful week at school. We might even take extra shifts with a sick child to allow our spouse to sleep. As we sacrificially love others, we demonstrate the greatest expression of love.

SCRIPTURE: John 15:9-17

9 As the Father hath loved me, so have I loved you: continue ye in my love.

10 If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments, and abide in his love.

11 These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full.

12 This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you.

13 Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.

14 Ye are my friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you.

15 Henceforth I call you not servants; for the servant knoweth not what his lord doeth: but I have called you friends; for all things that I have heard of my Father I have made known unto you.

16 Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask of the Father in my name, he may give it you.

17 These things I command you, that ye love one another.
